

magination is a wonderful thing. It is a gift that enables us to make sense of our world not only by the use of our reason or through our emotional faculties, but by our ability to think and indeed feel 'outside the box', beyond the constraints of reason or emotion. Imagination is a creative gift. It enables the composer to hear a tune even before it is played, the writer to conceive a tale even before it is told, the inventor to embrace a possibility even before it has been considered, and the scientist to pose an answer to a complex problem ahead of its confirmation by experimentation. It is to our imaginations that so many appeals are made. Advertising is a good example. We are invited to imagine what this or that might do to improve and enhance our lives. Indeed, we spend much of our time imagining and re-imagining our lives as we seek a better future for ourselves.

Jesus of Nazareth appealed to the imaginations of his contemporaries when he invited them to see God's kingdom dawning, and God's new future being realised. For a time, wherever Jesus went, that future could be glimpsed as people experienced forgiveness, healing, and new beginnings in their encounters with him. But even imagination has its limits. When Jesus was arrested, summarily tried and executed the imagined future of which he spoke suddenly melted away as if it were no more than a pleasant dream from which one wakes to the cold realities of life. When Jesus died, the imaginations of his followers died too - they fled and hid away for fear that they would be next to die, and despair and grief overwhelmed them. It's not hard to imagine how they must have felt!


John goes on to tell us that on the first day of the week after Jesus was crucified, Mary was at the garden tomb - weeping!

Not only was she grieving because of the trauma of Jesus' death two days earlier, but she was now distressed because the tomb had been disturbed and Jesus' body had gone missing. All she could think was "They have taken away my Lord and I do not know where they have laid him" (John 20: 13). Turning to a nearby stranger, whom she imagined to be the gardener, she asked if he knew anything about it. And then came a moment of amazed astonishment. The stranger spoke her name in a voice that she knew so well. And through the tears that clouded her eyes, she saw standing before her none other than Jesus himself. It was not possible, but there he was. There were no words that she could draw on to describe her experience - all she knew was that Jesus was dead no longer. He was alive. She ran to tell the others, "I have seen the Lord!"

This was no figment of her imagination. Soon the other disciples encountered the risen Jesus and knew for themselves that the crucified Jesus had been raised by God. The promised future that Jesus had led them to imagine, had not disintegrated in Jesus' death, quite the contrary, in fact. Jesus' death confirmed that new future. And no longer was it a future that must be imagined, but it had become a present reality in their lives. So St Paul wrote, "If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation" (2 Corinthians 5:17). A new world had indeed dawned and it was a world inhabited by the risen Christ to whom they now witnessed and whose company would always be with them.

God's new future is here - it is a future characterised by the love that gives all for us and our muddled world, and never gives up on us but patiently invites us to step into it and be part of it by following, serving and loving this Jesus. It is not an imaginary world, but the real world, carved out of suffering and characterised by unquenchable love. We imagine that our 'old world' is all there is. Easter offers us the real world, God's world. Just let your imagination loose for a while so that you might see it, experience it and live it.
