Prayer for Change

Today as I write this article I reflect on a TV programme I've just watched, together with millions around the world. The inauguration of President Obama. He got there on a ticket of change, and in his inaugural speech he painted a picture that needed great change, from economics that reward the greedy, from politics that live on dividing people, from policy initiatives that depend on force, and on treatment of people as subhuman just because they disagree with you.

For the first time today I learnt that Obama's middle name was Hussein. How could the US have done this: not just an African /American but one with Muslim connections?



True, when we were in the US last autumn, it was obvious that he possessed a charisma that reached out to a huge variety of people; it needed to, for the mountain he had to climb was immense.

But it may turn out that that was the easy bit. He called for immense change in many fields of politics; now he and the American people have to deliver it. It will not be easy in a country that is very conservative and largely ignorant of the world beyond its national boundaries. But here is a man born in Hawaii of a father from Kenya. It may well take a person of such a hybrid descent to do it. We wait with baited breath; there is an awful lot hanging on him and his presidency.

The closing prayer of the inaugural ceremony was absolutely beautiful, a fitting end to a ceremony and a fitting beginning to this time of change. And it reminded me of the need and power of prayer. Obama and his administration are going to need all the prayer support possible, by the whole world, not just by the American people. Why not spend a little time of your daily devotion time to remember before God this young man and the task that lies before him?
