

magine having to take the Covenant Service promises seriously. Just suppose we really meant them. And suppose God took them seriously too; what would we be letting ourselves into? We'd be like the disciples, who one minute were fishermen, and the next were fishers of men. Off they went, leaving behind all security, and allowing a wandering teacher to take control of where they went and what they did. I suppose there would be an element of excitement in doing that, but what a risk!

Today we are deeply enmeshed by a culture of risk management. Things that we did as children we would not now dare to let our grandchildren do; we are 'managing risks', and so everything is 'safe'. Of course that means life might also be a lot less exciting, less adventurous. We spend a lot of time working out whether the risk is worth it. So much so that the opportunity, whatever it was, may well have passed us by, and we feel a sense of relief but perhaps tinged with a slight feeling of regret, when we find the question of whether to take the risk has gone out of our hands because we are too late. But then I suppose that is the world we live in. It's safer by far to play 'virtual' games on the computer, or read a book and experience life's adventures through someone else, and manage the real risks to ourselves or our loved ones to completely safe levels.

But the covenant promises contain no 'risk assessment', no 'get out' clause, if God were to take them seriously. Imagine reciting the covenant prayer but adding the condition *only if you* (God) *don't take advantage of me*. You and I would never do that would we? Those promises are not like New Year resolutions, to be taken seriously only on January 1st, acknowledged vaguely on January 6th and lost without trace by January 10th.

So imagine if we took the Covenant Promises seriously and God also took them seriously, what might happen then? We'd become disciples, I suppose. Just imagine that. And if all the Christians all over the world did the same, just imagine what might happen then?

### Important Church Meeting

Our next Church Meeting will be at 10.30 am on Saturday 30th January. By having the meeting on a Saturday morning rather than an evening we hope to encourage more people to attend. The meeting will particularly focus on looking at the future of our church, and setting some achievable targets for ourselves in line with the Vision 2020 which Allen Morton has outlined below. We really would like to hear everyone's views so please make the effort to attend if you can. If you are not able to attend but have some ideas, please pass them to Betty, David or Allen before the meeting.

### Local Mission Pledge

Saturday 30<sup>th</sup> January is a very important date in the life of Stansted Free Church. Members will meet to consider making our church's local mission pledge for the coming year or two, as our practical response to the 2020 Vision consultation. The 2020 Vision is part of the overall United Reformed Church's Vision 4 Life renewal process with its three stages, seeking to help every member renew their relationship with the Bible, Prayer and Evangelism. The 2020 Vision consultation invites each local church to ask: Where would we like the United Reformed Church to be in 10 years time, locally and nationally? Ten statements were offered for discussion and response:

### By 2020

- Every local church will be able to say who they are, and what they do and why they do it
- We will have grown in our practice of prayer
- We will be more confident in our identity, when it comes to working ecumenically
- We will be a church that is more active in the life of local neighbourhoods

- We will be a diverse church that does more to welcome and include all people equally
- We will be more confident to engage in evangelism, in whatever way that finds expression
- We will be a growing church with an increasing membership
- We will be a church that is an active partner in God's global mission with other churches around the world
- We will be a church that keeps faith with the poor and challenges injustice
- We will be a denomination where each congregation has taken different steps to safeguard the integrity of creation, to sustain and renew the life of the earth.

As a further step in this envisioning the life of the church, each congregation is encouraged to make its own local mission pledge. What do we want to achieve in the next two or three years? That shorter time-frame makes the issue more immediate and manageable. Whatever we pledge as a congregation has to be realisable in that time. Then we would review the outcome and consider a further pledge to take us forward. David Mullins and I, together with the Church Oversight Group, very much hope that as many members as possible will join us for this exciting morning's work, starting at 10.30 am in the Hall.
