

magine you were convinced that our leaders knew that the truest, fairest, kindness, wisest of all possible leaders was born and would replace all of them? What would our leaders choose to do? Would they rejoice that their true hopes were to be fulfilled if the child grows to adulthood and, therefore, rush to find him and protect him so that a supreme regime of justice and peace would one day exist? Or would they seek to eliminate a great threat to their own power and devise methods of controlling the child for their own ends? Or even murder the child to maintain the current order they oversee?

How would all of us respond? Would we be willing to give up our ideas of how society should be shaped, especially those ideas that make us special, deserving or righteous? Would we prepare our lives, our family, our friends for this radical new order? Or would we deny it? Might we hedge our choices, in case this incredible new order might not arrive?

The arrival of Jesus Christ, our incarnate God, raises all these questions. We see all sorts of positive and negative reactions among leaders and ordinary people. We even see reactions changing over time, with a person like Nicodemus whose discipleship matured over three episodes in John's Gospel.

In this new year, we can and should hope for our own discipleship to mature, allowing our Lord's kingdom to come closer in ways that we might not see or understand or even want just yet. We are all called to pray into our uncertainty, to bring our fears, angers, reservations, resistances to our Lord, to allow the Holy Spirit to help us resolve our purposes into the purpose of God, the Father.
